VESTRY OF THE WHOLE CONGREGATION MEETING HIGHLIGHTS
November 12, 2023

St. Luke's Vestry of the Whole Congregation meeting was called to order by Kathy Hansen at 10:17 a.m. Jeanne Owen offered the opening prayer. One additional item was added to the consent agenda, presentation of the letter to Canon Martha requesting her assistance in improving communication between St. Luke's and the diocese through a communication workshop. The minutes of the October 8th Vestry Meeting were approved as corrected.

Junior Warden Ann Holley reported that wall brackets requested by the tech team can be purchased for \$300 and mounted on two of the interior sanctuary walls to hold the video cameras used during videotaping of our Zoom services and church meetings. This will eliminate the need for the tripods. Copies of the new lease and maintenance agreement with Coastal Copy were provided with the vestry packet. The new contract will reduce St. Luke's copy charges by 16%.

Ann also discussed the status of the bid for power washing, resurfacing and sealing of the church parking lot. Mitch Frederick who provided a bid last year to Mike Ferree has offered to complete the job for last year's price with a 10% church discount. A motion was made by Ann Holley, seconded by Mary Gruber to appropriate up to \$5,000 for the resurfacing and sealing. Treasurer Leann Brooks confirmed \$3,000 is available for the project in the Buildings and Grounds budget. The motion was tabled to allow Ann and Mike to meet with Mike Frederick to determine if the process can be divided and partially completed this year and finished in 2024. Ann is working on creation of a youth area at the back of the sanctuary for our young teens who attend our regular service.

Kathy Hansen who has assumed responsibility for the reallocation of administrative and liturgical responsibilities, reported on the meeting of the Worship Committee. Pastor Karen Siegfried will be presiding and preaching at the Christmas Eve Service at 5:00 p.m. on December 24, 2023. There will be no Sunday morning service on that day. Pastor Karen will also continue to preside and serve on the first Sundays of the month beginning on Epiphany Sunday, January 7, 2024. Reverend Caro Hall has also agreed to provide supply services once a month; Pastor Ellen Ayres will continue serving once a month. The worship committee is exploring adding one additional clergy led service per month on the 4th or 5th Sundays. Worship committee members also discussed and recommended increasing the honorarium for supply clergy from the diocesan rate to \$250 plus mileage.

Treasurer Leann Brooks reported St. Luke's is doing well. We have \$99,065 in operating our accounts; \$15,894 in non-operating accounts; \$24,959 in the Pacific Premier Checking account and \$53,862 in the Pacific Premier money market account. \$91,372 is invested with the Diocesan Investment Trust. St. Luke's total current assets are \$170,193. St. Luke's Operating Profit & Loss Statement projects net ordinary income

year to date at -\$26,163; with the annual net income budget projected at -\$30,497. More precise figures will be available once the Stewardship Campaign concludes.

Jeanne Owen concluded the meeting with a closing prayer. The meeting adjourned at 11:30 a.m.

SENIOR WARDEN TASK REALLOCATION UPDATE

We are pleased to report that Mike Ferree has agreed to serve as the official "Sr. Warden" of St. Luke's. This does not mean that Mike is going to do all of the work that was previously under the wing of the Sr. Warden. In fact, he will be doing only the 3 tasks that were previously identified as tasks which only a Sr. Warden can do. His main job will be reviewing and signing contracts as the official representative of the Vestry of the Whole. We are so thankful that Mike has stepped up to do this part of the work. Many people have stepped up to take on the rest of the work that needs to be done to keep St. Luke's running but we still have a couple of outstanding items. Notably we still need someone to serve as the main writer of purchase orders. This involves going by the office once or twice a week, to look at the bills and write purchase orders so that the bookkeeper can write and mail checks. This usually amounts to 2-6 purchase orders per month. Once in a while the purchase order writer will need to check with the Jr. Warden to see if work being billed has actually been performed. The purchase order writer is important as an extra set of eyes, an extra safeguard, to the process of disbursing funds from St. Luke's. Purchase orders are written by hand and are not complicated. Supporting Food Security in our Communities

The beginning of 2023 was met with a wet slap in the face (or, more specifically, a wet floor). During the January floods, water coming through the wall covered 75% of the Pantry floor, requiring months of repairs. We had to shut our doors

one of the repair days—the first time we've had to cancel food distribution in almost 40 years! The repair costs were kept low, due to funding from the SLO Community Foundation and the SLO County Board of Supervisors—and especially due to the 135+hours of labor donated by ALF volunteers, as well as those from Atascadero Land Preservation.

But due to the increase in the number of clients we serve and the amount of food we provide, that building—which ALF has owned since 1995—is barely meeting our needs. Our 11 refrigerators and 12 freezers are stuffed with food. The staging areas hold up to 50 newly-prepared boxes every day. Some rooms previously available for client interviews have been repurposed as storage. We continue to search for a larger building—with more parking (an on-going problem)—to serve our growing needs.

January saw the switch to a new software program that makes our interviews with clients move more smoothly and stores the client data safely. Starting in mid-2022, our volunteer IT experts worked behind the scenes to transition to the new software that now makes it easier than ever to collect statistics required for grant applications and other needs. A grant from the Community Foundation of SLO County allowed us to purchase the necessary computer equipment.

In June, the Atascadero Kiwanis club, a long-time partner, made ALF the recipient of the proceeds of their Winemakers' Dinner. Always a successful fundraiser, the event raised \$55,000 to put towards the purchase of a new facility, for which we are thankful.

The cost to purchase the healthy food our clients need often exceeds \$600 a day. This is in addition to the food we receive free from the SLO Food Bank—we are their largest client!—and from local grocery stores, as well as in-kind donations from organizations, faith communities, and individuals. And those packed refrigerators and freezers don't run for free, despite the solar panels on our roof. Our utility costs run almost \$1,000 per month.

ALF Food Pantry is proud to be part of such a supportive community—we hope you will continue your generosity this holiday season and throughout 2024.

2: number of visits clients can make each month

35: average number of boxes of groceries distributed each day (often more)

50: pounds of food for a household of 1-3 each visit
75: pounds of food for a household of 4-6 each visit

We work from a Sustainable Menu that advises what kinds of food (meat, pasta, fresh fruit and vegetables, bread, cereal, peanut butter, milk and eggs) goes into each box, balancing good nutrition with good budgeting—and every day there is "extra" food that is added to the main box, depending on what is available in ALF's storage shelves and refrigerators.


And what do we need to pull all these numbers and procedures together? We need volunteers! We are an all-volunteer organization: volunteers purchase and unload and store groceries, they create the boxes for afternoon distribution, they meet directly with clients and distribute food. Some work weekly, some as substitutes, some to plan fundraisers, some as Board members. These individuals find great satisfaction in giving to their community through ALF—and great enjoyment in working with other volunteers. Despite in-kind donations, it still takes a lot of money to keep our organization running. Our grant receipts have been down the last few years, so it has fallen to our local community to keep ALF running: about 75% of our revenue comes from individuals—from the \$5 bills handed to a volunteer to the bequests left as part of an estate and everything in between. (Consider transferring stock directly to ALF and you may not have to pay taxes on it!) Please send a check or donate through our website.


